Shipmates,

- D. Secretary:

How Submarine Sonarmen Tirelessly Hunt For Enemies They Can't Even See

Sound analysis is a vital tool in naval operations. Sonar operators are a trained group of sailors who are responsible for managing a large amount of real-time acoustic information. They combine some natural ability with yearlong shore-based training before putting on a set of headphones at sea. The means and methods of the sonar operator's job are one part of science combined with some individual talent to recognize acoustic patterns both audibly and visually. In this article, we will dive into what a sonar team provides the tactical decision-makers on board a vessel and how they go about providing it.

The U.S. Naval force faces a national security crisis: insufficient attack submarines to defend our shores. A concerning report from the Congressional Research Service found that around 40 % of fast attack submarines need to be repaired or awaiting maintenance due to supply chain issues and not enough workers available. Attack submarines are an excellent deterrent against our adversaries, but the U.S. is failing to meet production standards.

2015 was the last year that the Navy missed its target of 20% for out-of-commission submarines. With its current high of out-of-commission submarines, the number of attack submarines has shrunk in a decade from 53 to 49, which is unsustainable. For comparison, the U.S. in the 80s produced three attack submarines and one ballistic missile submarine every year of the decade. The Navy's standard requirement is 66 for its current military obligations which is the minimum for defending our shores.

Why It's Important to Inform DFAS of Life-Changing Events

Alerting DFAS to any changes that might affect your Survivor Benefit Plan promptly can make your beneficiary's experience much easier. Keeping your account updated includes:

- -making sure you report life-changing events right away
- -ensuring your beneficiary choices are current, and
- -providing up-to-date contact information for both you and your beneficiary.

What are life-changing events? Events like:

- -Marriage or Remarriage
- -Divorce
- -Birth or adoption of a child
- -Death of a spouse or child

Be sure to report any change of life events as soon as they happen. Some changes to Survivor Benefit Plan coverage have a one-year time limit, so it is very important that you notify DFAS promptly.

If you are making a change to your SBP coverage because of a life event, you can now use the convenient, online askDFAS upload tool on DFAS.mil to submit your DD2656-6 (Survivor Benefit Plan Election Change Certificate) and supporting documents. And when you submit a DD 2656-6, you'll get email status notifications to the email you provide in askDFAS, or if you send it by postal mail or fax, to the email in your myPay account.

Clearing Fake Pop-Up Virus Messages

This is similar to an article I had some time ago but I have been helping more people lately recover from it lately and felt it might be worth repeating.

When you are on the internet with your "browser" (Edge, Chrome, Firefox, etc.) and are searching for information, you may click on a site

that appears to be related to your search. This site is actually a fake site that will then display a screen that says you have a virus or something else wrong with your computer. It will usually say it is from Microsoft or a virus software company and will warn you to IMMEDIATELY CALL the phone number on that screen to have a "Microsoft technician" fix the issue. It may or may not be talking warning you not to shut down the computer or close that window.

NEVER CLICK ON THE WINDOW OR CALL THE PHONE NUMBER ON THE SCREEN !!!!!

if YOU CALL THE PHONE NUMBER, they will say they need to take "control" of your screen so they can "analyze your computer". If you give them control, it will look like they are doing something to your computer, but they are actually INSTALLING MALWARE on your computer. After they "analyze your computer" they will tell you they found "serious problems" with the computer and the charge is about \$300 to "fix it". They will ask for your credit card number to pay to fix your computer. At this point they have already installed the MALWARE so your computer is already compromised. Giving them your credit card only makes it worse because now they can use it to charge other things.

If you did let them on your computer you may need to take it to a professional to have any MALWARE removed or restore you computer. If you gave them your credit card number, you need to immediately call your card provider to stop the card and have any charges reversed.

WHAT TO DO WHEN THE MESSAGE FIRST POPS UP

When the virus message first pops-up DO NOT CLICK ON THE MESSAGE OR TRY TO CLOSE IT. This could trigger code to install something on the computer or to make it the "default" screen when the "browser" opens. At this point, this message is usually an HTML file that is only in that "browser" and is not actually doing anything to your computer unless you click on it and it initiates code. It may have made itself the "default screen" for that "browser" so it would keep opening each time you open that browser.

Steps to clear the virus warning screen from your computer.

Step 1

If you have **Task Manager** on your **Task Bar** or **Start Menu** (discussed in a previous newsletter), you can open the **Task Manager** and click on the "browser" (Edge, Chrome, Firefox, etc.) that you are using and select "**End Task"**. This should close the browser and the pop-up screen.

If Task Manager is not on your Task Bar or Start Menu, then press Ctrl-Alt-Del and a screen will come up to allow you to open the Task Manager and close the affected browser.

If this worked (or did not work) then proceed to Step 2.

Step 2

Click on the Start Menu Icon ☐ then select

Power then select Shut down. After the computer shuts down, wait a couple of minutes before restarting to make sure all memory is cleared.

Step 3

Restart the computer and Log into your area. Before opening anything, run a "complete" virus and malware scan on the computer. If you have additional malware programs installed (such as SuperAntiSpyware) then run them also. These programs can usually be run at the same time.

Step 4

After the virus and malware scans have been run. Click on the "browser" (Edge, Chrome, Firefox, etc.) you were using when the pop-up message occurred. When the "browser" opens you may get a warning that the browser was not properly closed and an option to "Restore previous pages" will be offered. **DO NOT RESTORE PREVIOUS PAGES** since one of those "previous pages" is the initial virus message

Close the "Browser" by clicking on the X in the upper right corner to close the "browser". After the browser closes then reopen the browser. This time the warning to "Restore previous pages" should not appear.

Hopefully, the virus message has been cleared and will not reappear. You should be OK to use your computer. If the message does reappear repeat the steps again. If it keeps reappearing, you may have to get a professional to fix the problem.

You should open the browser setting (usually the 3 dots or bars in the upper right corner). You should clear all browsing history, data, cookies, and review the Start pages to make sure it is opening the desired pages on startup.

You may want to run the virus scans again just to make sure nothing got installed.

This type of pop-up virus message usually only affects that browser and other "browsers" on your computer should normally not be affected.

Thunderbolt™ Interconnect Technology

One key decision that I recently had to make in selecting my replacement laptop was choosing between a computer with Universal Serial Port (USB) Type-C (USB-C) ports or with Thunderbolt™ ports. This necessitated me learning something about Thunderbolt™ and the newer versions of USB-C. This is my attempt to share what I learned about these technologies. The following is a layman's comparison (I'll let our experts provide any needed corrections in future Newsletters.)

Thunderbolt™ is an Intel® technology introduced in 2011 that has transitioned through four versions.

Thunderbolt™ 1 and Thunderbolt™ used a Mini-Display Port (MDP) that was common on Apple Products. The Thunderbolt™ 3 and Thunderbolt™ 4 physical connector is identical to a Universal Serial Port (USB)-C connector.

The Thunderbolt[™] 3 and Thunderbolt[™] is backward compatible with USB-C devices. The USB-C, Thunderbolt[™] 3, and Thunderbolt[™] 4 connector is symmetrical eliminating a right-side up only position.

USB Type-C (USB-C)

This is an industry-standard connector that is capable of transmitting power and data through a single cable. Now to complicate things. USB-C is a hardware standard (i.e., size of connector; prongs size, quantity, and location). USB 3.2 is a data-transfer standard that is compatible with a USB-C connector.

A USB-C connector can drive a HD monitor and can handle up to 100 W of power transfer. Those capabilities are software dependent and not port dependent. My new HP laptop uses a USB-C connector for the power supply.

The US has sent the nuclear-powered submarine USS Tennessee with 20 Trident II intercontinental ballistic missiles with a launch range of more than 12,000 kilometres to the UK

The US Navy has been revealing the location of strategic nuclear submarines that carry nuclear weapons with unexpected frequency over the past year. One of the Ohio class submarines has arrived in the UK.

Here's What We Know

In July, the USS Tennessee, bearing the submarine number (SSBN-734), anchored off the coast of Scotland. The submarine was visited by the head of the British Submarine Force, Commodore Paul Dunn, and the commander of European Command, US Army General Christopher Cavoli.



The US Navy has 18 Ohio-class nuclearpowered submarines, 14 of which carry up to 20 Trident II (D5) intercontinental ballistic missiles. The service does not say whether the USS Tennessee has nuclear weapons on board.

Our heroine, like other Ohio-class strategic submarines, can carry more than 100 nuclear warheads (3-8 for each missile). The Trident II (D5) has a maximum launch range of over 12,000 kilometres.

8 of the 14 Ohio-class submarines operate in the Pacific Ocean. The area of responsibility of the remaining submarines is the Atlantic. The USS Kentucky recently visited the Republic of Korea for the first time since 1981.

More than a third of U.S. submarines are out of commission due to ship-building delays, according to data released by the Congressional Research Service.

Thirty-seven percent of the U.S. Navy's attack submarines—18 out of 49—are out of commission for repairs, up from 12 boats a decade ago. The Congressional Research Service said the backlog was due to "insufficient numbers of workers and facility constraints" at naval shipyards as well as "supply chain issues," saying that the delays have cut the "force's capacity for meeting day-to-day mission demands and potentially putting increased operational pressure" on active boats.

The statistic demonstrates the extent of U.S. naval unpreparedness for a potential war with China. The U.S. Naval Institute said in May that China's Navy is the largest in the world and is expected to grow to 440 "battle force" ships by 2030, while the United States will sit at 290 battle

force ships the same year. Dozens of Pentagon war games

published last month revealed the United States is unprepared for a "horrifically bloody" war with China.

Gatestone Institute senior fellow Gordon Chang said last month the United States is "not prepared to fight China."

"It's not just a question of having a larger Navy than ours," Chang told Fox Business. "It's also a question that they have types of weapons that we don't have and which right now we have no defenses for."

The Biden administration's 2024 budget proposal asked for sharp budget cuts to the Navy and the premature retirement of eight ships and two combat vessels, the Washington Free Beacon reported. Sending these ships to an early retirement would remove more than 600 vertical missile launch systems.

'Sir, Our Aircraft Carrier Was Destroyed': How a Stealth Submarine Killed a Navy Carrier in a Simulation

Sweden's Gotland-class Submarines are Quiet and Deadly: Diesel engines aboard submarines used to be considered out of date and something more in line with World War II than today's modern stealthy subs.

Not so with Sweden's Gotland-class of subs. These modern diesel-electric boats, now powered by air-independent propulsion (AIP), are so quiet that the U.S. Navy took an interest and leased one of the models to conduct testing and war games.

How the Gotland Sank the USS Ronald Reagan in a War Game

The reason why there is so much interest in the Gotland-class submarines comes largely from a wargame several years back that went very bad for the U.S. Navy.

The HMS Gotland was able to penetrate the defensive measures of a carrier strike group in 2005. The small sub got so close it produced a photo of the carrier USS Ronald Reagan near San Diego. In a naval war game such as this, it is considered a "sinking."

The Navy liked the Gotland so much that it leased it for a second year for more simulations. Now the Chinese have the same reduced-noise technology that is proving a challenge for American undersea warfare tactics.

It's a Robust, Multi-role Sub

The Gotland-class boats were originally designed by Saab-Kockums and commissioned in the mid-to-late 1990s. These subs can fulfill all kinds of roles – from surface-attack to killing other submarines to dropping off special operations forces personnel. There are three of the boats in the Gotland-class and they are able to sneak up on adversaries and snoop for communications and electronic intelligence.

The Gotland Kicked Butt in War Games Against the U.S. Navy

The U.S. Navy, with some of the best antisubmarine ships and aircraft in the world, just could not find the Gotland in combat simulations. The relatively low-cost \$100 million (cheaper than a nuclear-powered model) sub was able to sneak around at will while performing opposing force (OPFOR) maneuvers. The Gotland and the American carrier battle group, consisting of several support ships, ran the simulation <u>over and over</u> and the Gotland still came out on top.

What's the Secret?

The secret to the Gotland's low acoustic signature is the quiet Air Independent Propulsion (AIP) system of the Stirling engine. This means the Gotland does not have to surface often or use a noisy snorkel like traditional diesel boats. Instead, the Stirling engine has a 75-kilowatt battery that uses liquid oxygen. The Stirling produces speeds of 11-knots on the surface and 20-knots submerged. The Gotland just runs on AIP for weeks at a time. The Swedes were the first to employ this type of propulsion.

Run Silent and Be Hard to Find

It has 27 electromagnets designed to lower its magnetic signature. Its hull is more sonar-resistant, and the tower is made of materials with some stealth characteristics. Equipment inside is covered with rubber acoustic-deadening to reduce sonar detection.

Not a Very Big Sub

The subs are relatively small at 205-feet long, have a beam of 20-feet, and a draft of 18-feet with a displacement of 1,380 tons. The crew numbers are low and only a maximum of 32 sailors can serve on board.

Watch Out for the Torpedoes

The Gotland has two 533mm and two 400mm torpedo tubes. The Bofors Type 613 torpedoes are launched from the 533mm tubes. The Type 613 is a muscular torpedo used in surface warfare. It has wire-guidance and homes in on targets, sending a warhead of 529 pounds. The sub can also lay mines.

Gotland-class Submarine Gets Upgrades

Since the Gotland was originally produced in the 1990s, the Swedes instituted a 2020 mid-life upgrade During this time 50 systems such as navigation and sensors were newly fitted, and others changed. The next generation of the Blekinge-class will allow the subs to assess their environment with an optronic mast, which will

replace the periscope.

U.S. Navy vs. Gotland: A Rematch?

If it hasn't already, the U.S. Navy should work with the Swedish Navy to replicate the 2005 training exercises to see if the Americans can improve their performance against the upgraded Gotland-class. This would be extremely helpful as China now has AIP technology and would surely use such submarines in a naval conflict with the U.S. Navy.
