Shipmates,

9.6.2023: Dear Family and Friends,

Donna's back problems have not resolved, despite two surgeries and other pain treatments. She still has significant pain in her back and right leg, which is reduced with meds but not below about a 5 or a 6. The back surgeon says he cannot help her further. We are working with the pain doctor and he is recommending a nerve stimulator to see if that will help. We are proceeding down that track, which will take some time to set up.

Sandy's cancer – The August 27, 2023 PET/ CT showed some nodules of cancer grew a little while some others shrank showing Keytruda has not failed completely. Keytruda treatments will be continued; the outcome we wanted. The next check on Keytruda's effectiveness will be on November 12, 2023. We live in three-month increments!

We are looking into the possibility of treating three spots of cancer in my muscle tissue, one in my right shoulder and two in my gluten area (butt) to eliminate these spots which are growing and thus reduce the cancer load on my immune system and let Keytruda be more effective.

Best submarine tour video I've ever seen, except no nuclear engineering spaces, sorry guys. A submarine's nuclear stuff is really secretive.

NOTE: In about 1982, a sub-CO I knew well once gave a tour of the nuclear engineering spaces to a senior Navy Chaplain, an O-6 (Captain). Problem was, he had no security clearance. That CO got fired.

I'd never seen the inside of a VIRGINIA class boat and I loved this video. Many things really are different these days, but it's still basically the same submarining.

The Captain gives the tour and he does a really good job. I noted he has an Antarctic Service Medal, so he did a shore duty tour doing that. I was hoping he'd mention doing that, but he

didn't.


He mentions the Submarine Force shifted to 3 sections of 8-hour watches about 10 years ago. I didn't know that. We did 3-section 6-hour watches in my day which resulted in a rotating 18-hour day. That worked far better in my view. We used to chat about how the shrinks of the world went on about a built-in 24-hour circadian rhythm and it really messed you up otherwise. Balderdash. The Navy just let them roll them over on that.

"The submarine is not, like other small vessels, compelled to select for its antagonist a vessel of about its own or inferior power; the larger and more powerful its mark, the better its opportunity." John P. Holland

The Submarine Service

The Submarine Service is distinctly American both in tradition and in spirit.

History records that the genius of American science created the modern submarine. It is as American as the telegraph, the airplane, the dive bomber and the carrier.

Although submersible craft had been in development for thousands of years, four Americans, David Bushnell, Robert Fulton, John Philip Holland and Simon Lake, comprised the coterie of inventors who transformed ancient dreams into an effective and practical underseas craft.

Hence, the increasing success of the American submarines in the present war [sic WWII] is but a natural outcropping of history, a to-be-expected fulfillment of the past. With a determination backed by trained skill, the men of the Submarine Service have made the submarine one of the most deadly of the Navy's many weapons.

By nature of its operations, the Submarine Service is shielded in secrecy. It has always been so. As a result, the Submarine Service has long been the Silent Service.

Yet, while the operations themselves are a secret, the effects of the submarine campaign upon the war are not. Admiral Nimitz has already publicly expressed the view that our submarines have been and will be a controlling factor in the course of the war.

As Admiral King has already indicated: "When the full story can be told, it will constitute one of the most stirring chapters in the annals of naval warfare."

The History of 'APRONS'

The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath because she only had a few and because it was easier to wash aprons than dresses and aprons required less material. But along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven.

I volunteer af two senior centers to try to help seniors with computer and software issues. Whenever someone comes to me with an issue on something I have little experience with, I usually open YouTube and type into the Search bar what I am looking for. .HEIC Picture Files to .JPG

My iPhone is now at 16.1 and soon will go to 16.6.1 and while trying to e-mail some photos, I found the the Photos app on the iPhone does not appear to have access to mail (at this moment).

So while I researched that problem, I connected my iPhone to my Windows 10, and uploaded the photos I need into my Windows Photos library and my hard drive. I go to the hard drive expecting .JPG files only to find them saved in .HEIC format instead. Thanks Apple!!!

So I found a neat app to use via this article:

How to Batch Convert HEIC Images to JPEG

Format in Windows 10 & 11 from the good folks at MakeUseOf. I installed it per the article and it solved my most pressing problem very quickly.

Before you die, decide who gets access to your online accounts and digital files BY KIM KOMANDO, KOMANDO.COM NOVEMBER 8, 2021

Have you given any thought as to what you want to happen to your accounts, files, photos, and the rest of your online life once you're gone? If the number of calls and requests I am getting for help on my national radio show is any indication, do it now while you're thinking about it. In life, it's hard enough to keep it all secure. That's why I continually focus on the ever-changing steps to keep you safe. Tap or click for five smartphone security steps to take now to keep hackers and scammers out.

Your phone isn't the only target. A person with the right know-how can break into your router, your social media pages; you name it.

Let's get your digital life in order for those you leave behind. Take a look at this list below, and you may want to assign a person to be your "digital executor." Ask your estate attorney about that.

1. Create a digital checklist

A digital checklist isn't a legal document but rather a rundown of all your accounts, passwords, and online assets with instructions on how to find them. Take a look at your saved passwords in your browser so you don't miss any accounts. Then, think of other accounts like Venmo or Zelle.

This tech checklist can be as formal or informal as you like. It could be an Excel spreadsheet that includes websites, log-in details, and anything else you want to leave behind. If you go this route, password protect the file and leave the password in your will. A safer option is to use a regularly updated password manager app or program.

Alternatively, you could go low-tech using pen and paper.

2. Take care of Facebook

Facebook lets you name a legacy contact who can handle your account when you die. This person can write posts, update your profile photo, and get a copy of everything you did on Facebook.

- On desktop: When you're signed into
 Facebook, go to Settings & Privacy > Settings and look for Memorialization Settings.
- On mobile: Select the three-lined Menu option in the bottom right. Scroll down to "Settings & Privacy." Tap to open that, then select Settings. From the Account menu at the top of the next screen, select Personal and Account Information > Account Ownership and Control. You'll see "Memorialization Settings." Click to select your legacy contact (and notify your contact they're now in that role).

Once you have your legacy contact set, go to the Memorialization Settings. You can decide whether the person you chose can download a copy of what you've shared on your feed, including posts, photos, videos, and profile information.

Once a year, you will receive a reminder of the person you chose as your legacy contact. If you're sure your person won't change or that you'll remember to change them if need be, you can click "stop annual reminders" in the Annual Reminder section.

If you'd rather have your account deleted after you pass away, get to the Memorialization Settings page and scroll down. Right above the Close button, there is an option you can click that says, "Request that your account be deleted after you pass away."

3. Don't forget about Twitter

Twitter doesn't have the same memorial or legacy features, but it will remove an account of someone who has died. Not just anyone can ask, though. Twitter says it will work with a person authorized to act on behalf of the deceased or an immediate family member.

If you want to request an account be deleted, you can submit that here. Twitter will email you instructions. Be prepared with a copy of your ID and the person's death certificate.

While this is doable, it is a pain. When you're preparing for your own passing, you're best off leaving instructions and your password in your digital checklist if you'd like anyone to be able to access your account.

4. There's Instagram, too

Like its parent company Facebook, your family can request the deletion of your Instagram account or have it memorialized. Instagram requires proof that the person has passed away to memorialize an account, like an obituary or news article.

If you need to delete an Instagram account for someone deceased, tap or click here to fill out the report. If you choose to memorialize an account, it can't be changed or altered in any way. This includes any previous likes, followers, tags, posts, and comments.

5. Wipe your Google account

You probably have a few things in your search, watch, and location history that you'd prefer to stay private. By setting up auto-delete, anyone with access to your account after you are gone will have access to what you want them to see.

Here's the good news: As of June 2020, Google auto-deletes account records after 18 months by default. If you want to shorten that window, you can in a few steps.

- Go to your Google Activity controls and log in with your Google account.
- Under Web & App Activity, you'll see Autodelete. Be sure this is turned On. Click the arrow to choose your preferred

timeframe: 3 months, 18 months, or 36 months.

6. Lock down your phone

Most of us don't want anyone going through our phones once we're gone. If you do, share the code in your digital checklist. Otherwise, follow these steps.

On an iPhone, enable Erase data. With this option enabled, everything will be wiped from your device after 10 failed passcode attempts. Sure, 10 is a lot of tries, but there are 10,000 possible combinations if your passcode is four digits.

Go to Settings > Face ID & Passcode > Enter your password. At the bottom of the menu, you will see "Clear data." Slide the button to the **right** to enable this setting.

Warning: If you have children, you must make backups regularly. Otherwise, if a little one gets your phone and tries unsuccessfully to unlock it more than 10 times, you could lose everything.

Sadly, this feature isn't native to Android phones, so you'll need a third-party app.

7. Share your bank and financial details with someone you trust

Here's another major headache for the loved ones that you leave behind. Trying to access financial sites and bank accounts after someone passes is a big undertaking.

When you're compiling your digital checklist, be sure to include any accounts a trusted family member or friend may need access to. Include your bank, 401K or any other retirement accounts, investment accounts, and any other place you have funds stored.

Be sure they are all locked down in the meantime. <u>Tap or click for 5 critical settings so hackers can't access your bank accounts.</u>

8. Share or download your photos

While the idea of someone swiping through your search history and text messages is a bit

unsettling, there is one thing you might want to pass along: Your photos.

All the pictures you've taken over the years can paint a beautiful picture of your life. You can do this in a few ways.

If you only want to share specific photos, start gathering them up now and add them to a folder in your photo or cloud service of choice. Share them now or wait until later, but you will need to do this while you're still able.

You can also download a copy of all your photos or select images and store them on your computer or an external drive. Make sure, of course, the password to your computer is in your digital checklist.

If you're an Apple user, it's simple to download all your iCloud photos to a Mac. Open the Photos app, then click Photos > Preferences. A menu will pop up. Choose iCloud at the top, and click the box next to "Download Originals to this Mac."

If you use Google Photos, easily archive all your photos outside of Google's cloud storage using Google Takeout. Select only Photos and you can even choose which albums to include in the download. This download could be huge if you have years of photos stored.

Veterans Comprehensive Prevention, Access to Care, and Treatment Act of 2020 (COMPACT)

Starting on January 17, Veterans in suicidal crisis can go to any health care facility, at VA or in the community, for free emergency health care – including transportation costs – and receive inpatient or crisis residential care for up to 30 days, and outpatient care for up to 90 days, including social work.

This could increase access to acute suicide care to an additional 9 million unenrolled Veterans and reduce the number of Veteran suicides by offering immediate care when they are most vulnerable.

COMPACT-eligible individuals, regardless of VA enrollment status, are:

- → Those who were discharged or released from active duty after more than 24 months of active service under conditions other than dishonorable.
- → Former members of the armed forces, including reserve service members, who served more than 100 days under a combat exclusion or in support of a contingency operation either directly or by operating an unmanned aerial vehicle from another location who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

Former members of the armed forces who were the victim of a physical assault of a sexual nature, a battery of a sexual nature, or sexual harassment while serving in the armed forces. For more information, visit **Emergency Medical Care - Community Care (va.gov)**.

If you have not already, we encourage you to sign up for a My HealtheVet Premium account.

My HealtheVet is VA's private and secure online patient portal for Veterans, active-duty service members, and their dependents and caregivers. Its online resources and tools offer you greater control over your health and wellness.

A My HealtheVet Premium account includes mobile access to your personal health information, the ability to send secure messages to your VA care team and other VA staff, and additional resources that empower you to take ownership of your health care and wellness.

There are two types of MyHealtheVet accounts: Basic and Premium. If you are already signed up for MyHealtheVet, check the icon that appears next to your name on the MyHealtheVet website. If you have a if you have a "P" icon next to your name, you already have a Premium account. If you have a "B" icon, you can sign up for a Premium account by following the steps below:

U.S. Revives Cold War Submarine Spy Program To Counter China

The U.S. Navy is carrying out the biggest overhaul of its top-secret undersea surveillance network since the 1950s as China's naval power surges and new technologies are fast reshaping maritime warfare. Beijing has similar plans of its own.

On a windswept island 50 miles north of Seattle sits a U.S. Navy monitoring station. For years, it was kept busy tracking whale movements and measuring rising sea temperatures. Last October, the Navy gave the unit a new name that better reflects its current mission: Theater Undersea Surveillance Command.

The renaming of the spy station at the Whidbey Island facility is a nod to a much larger U.S. military project, according to three people with direct knowledge of the plans: conducting the biggest reconstruction of America's antisubmarine spy program since the end of the Cold War.

The revival of the multibillion-dollar effort, known as the Integrated Undersea Surveillance System (IUSS), comes as China has ramped up military exercises around Taiwan, heightening concerns about a potential conflict over the democratically ruled territory, which Beijing wants brought under its control.

The IUSS revamp project has not previously been reported. It involves modernizing America's existing network of underwater acoustic spy cables and retrofitting a fleet of surveillance ships with cutting-edge sensors and subsea microphones, moves aimed at boosting the military's ability to spy on its foes. The United States has agreed to sell Australia similar technology to help bolster allied defenses in the Pacific region.

The most innovative change in the Navy's ocean reconnaissance system is an investment in new technologies to miniaturize and globalize traditional maritime surveillance tools. The original network of fixed spy cables, which lie in secret locations on the ocean floor, was designed to spy on Soviet submarines seven decades ago, the three people said.

The Navy's plan includes deploying a fleet of unmanned sea drones to listen for enemy craft; placing portable "underwater satellite" sensors on the seafloor to scan for submarines; using satellites to locate ships by tracking their radio frequencies; and utilizing artificial intelligence software to analyze maritime spy data in a fraction

of the time human analysts would usually take.

The existence of the IUSS was only made public in 1991 at the end of the Cold War, and the details of its operations remain top secret, the three people said. The three spoke about the classified program on condition of anonymity.

Reuters was able to piece together details of the unit's plans through interviews with more than a dozen people involved in the effort, including two current Navy staffers working on maritime surveillance, advisors to the Navy and defense contractors involved in the projects.

The news agency also reviewed hundreds of Navy contracts. That examination identified at least 30 deals linked to the surveillance program signed over the last three years with defense giants as well as a string of startups working on unmanned sea drones and AI processing. A Reuters review of

ship-tracking data and satellite imagery also revealed new details about the Navy's secretive underwater cable laying.

The IUSS is led by Captain Stephany Moore, a veteran Navy intelligence officer. The program operates under the command of the Submarine Force U.S. Pacific Fleet, headed by Rear Admiral Richard Seif.

Moore and Seif declined interview requests. In response to questions from Reuters, a spokesperson for the Submarine Force U.S. Pacific Fleet said the Navy could not discuss specifics related to its undersea surveillance system for "operational security reasons."

"The systems have and will experience growth and recapitalization as subsea technologies are developed and as defense priorities are updated," the spokesperson said in a statement.

Tim Hawkins, a spokesperson for the U.S. 5th Fleet, which is based in the Middle East and has led U.S. sea drone trials, told Reuters the Navy is improving surveillance from "space to seabed" with the aim of painting the clearest-ever picture of global activity at sea.

China, meanwhile, is working on its own maritime spy program, known as the Great Underwater Wall, two U.S. Navy sources told

Reuters.

That system, already under construction, consists of cables fitted with sonar listening sensors laid along the seafloor in the South China Sea, a tense arena due to territorial disputes between Beijing and its neighbors. China is also building a fleet of underwater and surface sea drones to scour for enemy submarines, the two people said.

The Chinese push extends far into the Pacific. The state-run China Academy of Sciences said in 2018 it was operating two underwater sensors: one in Challenger Deep in the Mariana Trench, the deepest known point on earth; the other near Yap, an island in the Federated States of Micronesia.

Though China says these sensors are used for scientific purposes, they could detect submarine movements near the U.S. naval base on Guam, a Pacific island territory, the Navy sources said.

China's Ministry of Defense did not respond to requests for comment about any aspect of this story. China's Foreign Ministry declined to comment.

LA-Class Sub USS San Juan Arrives In Bremerton For Decommissioning

(KITSAP SUN 21 SEP 23) ... Peiyu Lin BREMERTON — The Los Angeles class submarine USS San Juan (SSN 751) arrived in Bremerton Wednesday afternoon for its scheduled decommissioning and deactivation at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, after 35 years of service.

The San Juan departed the Naval Submarine Base New London in Groton, Connecticut on Aug. 21, according to Submarine Readiness Squadron 32. Before heading to Puget Sound, the sub participated in its final exercise, Operation Nanook 20 23 with the Canadian Armed Forces and the U.S. Coast Guard. As part of the annual sovereignty operation and maneuver warfare exercise, the San Juan transited from the East Coast to the West Coast through the Northwest

Passage,

according to spokesperson Lt. Corey T. Jones at Submarine Group 9.

The San Juan's last deployment was completed in June when it returned to Groton from a six-month deployment to the European Command area of responsibility, according to the Navy.

A reception planned by the Navy League of the U.S. Bremerton-Olympic Peninsula Council and the Pacific Northwest Chapter of the Naval Submarine League will be hosted on October 6 to welcome the crew, the Navy League's spokesperson, Alan Beam confirmed.

The welcoming event will be at 4:30 p.m. at The Horse And Cow Pub And Grill in Bremerton.

The arrival of the 361-foot-long boat was a surprise for several local residents who happened to be at Bachmann Park or the surrounding area in the afternoon.

Carol Clingan, a health and PE teacher at Mountain View Middle School, saw the boat on her way home from school.

Seeing the San Juan sailing into Bremerton brought a sense of nostalgia to the former military spouse. For 16 years Clingan would watch the USS Nevada leaving past the Hood Canal Bridge, as Clingan's ex-husband served on the Bangorbased USS Nevada in the 1990s.

"That's so cool," Clingan said for her first time seeing a submarine at the Bremerton waterfront.

Seabeck resident Paula Miller-Barth and her son, Hayden, stopped by the park to have lunch. Having a neighbor who retired from the Navy, Miller-Barth has heard a lot about submarines and felt a sense of patriotism watching it return. She brought up a video call with her mother in New York so

her mother could see the submarine and shared the excitement through her cellphone screen.

The USS San Juan was commissioned in August 1988. It's the second U.S. warship named after San Juan, Puerto Rico. The boat has a crew of over 110 personnel, according to the Navy. https://www.kitsapsun.com/story/ news/2023/09/21/uss-san-juan-arrives-in-

U.S. Navy Brings Massive Fire Power To Tromsø

This is the first time a guided missile submarine of the Ohio-class makes port call to Northern Norway. The "USS Florida" is one of the most powerful warships in the world, capable of carrying up to 154 Tomahawk land-attack cruise missiles.

It was Thursday morning the massive nuclearpowered submarine surfaced in the fjord and slowly sailed to port at Grøtsund north of Tromsø.

"We are grateful to Norway for allowing "USS Florida" to conduct a port visit to Tromsø. Stops like these ensure that the submarine and her crew are able to continue their mission of promoting security and stability in the region," said Rear Adm. Stephen Mack, director of Maritime Operations, U.S. Naval Forces Europe/Africa.

This is not the first US Navy submarine visit to Tromsø, but never before has the large Ohioclass been welcomed by the Norwegians.

The "USS Florida" is one of four Ohio-class submarines that are converted from carrying ballistic missiles as part of the US naval deterrent to now being armed with Tomahawk cruise missiles.

It is unclear for how long the submarine has patrolled outside Northern Norway, waters of strategic importance also for the Russian Northern Fleet sailing out of the Kola Peninsula.

U.S. Sixth Fleet says in a statement on September 14 that the submarine prior to Tromsø made a scheduled visit to Naples, Italy in August.

According to the Federation of American Scientists, the U.S. Navy's nuclear Tomahawk land-attack cruise missile (TLAM/N) was retired in 2013, ending a long-lasting post-Cold War process of eliminating all non-strategic naval nuclear weapons from the Navy's arsenal.

The cruise missiles now onboard the rebuilt Ohio SSGNs are armed with conventional warheads, not nuclear.

In Tromsø, Norwegian officials will be allowed on board.

"We are excited to welcome distinguished visitors aboard while in Tromsø, as a visible demonstration of the strength of the U.S.-Norway partnership, and we look forward to continuing to operate with our long-standing NATO Ally as we work together towards our shared goals," said Rear Admiral Mack.

By coincidence, the Rear Admiral has the same name as the local beer brewery in Tromsø: Mack.

The Navy statement says nothing about how long "USS Florida" will stay in Tromsø but says that the crew "will have the opportunity to experience the rich culture of Tromsø, and build relationships with the local population.

Tromsø is famous in Norway for its nightlife, pubs and restaurants.
